REPORT ON 1999 CONTROL LINE WORLD CUP

Annex: Composition of the FAI, F2B, F2C and F2D juries of the World Cup competitions.

- The Control Line World Cup has been introduced in 1995 in classes F2A (speed), F2B (aerobatics), F2C (team-racing) and F2D (combat). This year two perpetual trophies for the F2C class called "F2C Landres 2000" have been sponsored by the Cercle Modéliste deBlénod Lorraine which is the club in charge of the organization of the 2000 Control Line World Championships and of the Grand Prix of France.

- For this fifth Control Line World Cup edition the number of competitions organised and the participation is, compared to last year, higher in combat (F2D), equivalent in team-racing (F2C) and lower in speed (F2A) and aerobatics (F2B). For the first time a competition has been organised outside of Europe in Argentina. An other competition was also planned in USA in combat but has been finally cancelled.

- **Norbert SCHMITZ (Germany)** won in **F2A** with 30 points scored with two second places and a third place. He is followed by Peter GRÜNDEL (Germany) with 27 points and Jean-Marc AUBE (France) with 21 points.

- **Gilbert BERINGER (France)** won with 80 points scored with three wins. He is followed by Jiri VEJMOLA (Czech Republic) with 73 points Sergey BELKO (Ukraine) with 65 points.

-The team **Pascal SURUGUE / Georges SURUGUE (France)** won in **F2C** with 64 points scored with one win, a second place and a fourth place. This team is followed by the team Jean MARET / Jean-Paul PERRET (France) with 57 points and the team Thierry OUGEN / Roland SURUGUE (France) with 52 points.

- **Stanislav TCHORNI (Ukraine)** won in **F2D** with 68 points scored with three wins. He is followed by Loet WAKKERMANN (Netherlands) with 57 points and Rudolf KONIGSHOFER (Austria) with 43 points.

ORGANISATION

The compositions of the juries of the different competitions are given in the annex. In the letter dated 22th of February 1999 sent to the organisers the rules of the Sporting Code concerning compositions of FAI Jury and panels of judges were clearly precise, which means:

FAI jury: application of the B.4.1 and B.4.4. rules of the Sporting Code with a FAI jury of three members who must be at least from two different nations and must have at least one language in common. Members of the jury may not compete in the event, except when the timetable gives a sub-division into categories. In that case, one or two members of the jury may compete in a category and must be replaced by alternate jury members (not competing in that category) for all matters involving that category.

Infringements to that rule has been noticed for:

- a) Ekaterinburg (Russia) : only one member in the jury.
- b) Wierzawice (Poland) : the three members of the jury are from the same country.
- c) Untersiggenthal (Switzerland) : the three members of the jury are from the same country.
- d) St. Peterburg (Russia) : only one member in the jury.

Informations concerning composition of the FAI Jury have not been received from Rafaela (Argentina), Vidreres (Spain), Kisvarda (Hungary), Gyula (Hungary) and Pecs (Hungary).

F2B panel of judges: application of the 4.2.13 rule of the Sporting Code which means a panel of at least three judges who shall preferably, each be of a different nationality and be selected from a list of persons who are approved by National Airports Controls for their proficiency and experience.

No infringement to that rule has been noticed.

F2C panel of judges: application of the 4.3.12 rule of the Sporting Code which means a panel of at least three judges selected from the list of judges approved by the CIAM, with, if possible, at least one language in common.

Infringements to that rule has been noticed for:

- a) Rafaela (Argentina) : none of the three members of the panel is from the CIAM list.
- b) Vidreres (Spain) : only one of the three members of the panel is from the CIAM list.
- c) Breitenbach (Switzerland) : only two members of the panel are from the CIAM list.
- d) Aalborg (Denmark) : only one member of the panel is from the CIAM list.
- e) Pecs (Hungary) : only one member of the panel is from the CIAM list.
- f) Gyula (Hungary) : only one member of the panel is from the CIAM list.
- g) Valladolid (Spain) : only one member of the panel is from the CIAM list.

F2D panel of judges: application of the 4.4.18 rule of the Sporting Code which means a panel of three judges (only one needs to be from the list approved by the CIAM) and who shall be at least two different nationalities. They must have at least one language in common.

Infringements to that rule has been noticed for:

- a) Rafaela (Argentina) : two judges only in the panel, both are from the same country and none of them is from the CIAM list.

- b) Ekaterinburg (Russia) : the three members of the panel are from the same country.
c) Aalborg (Denmark) : none of the three members of the panel is from the CIAM list.
d) St. Petersburg (Russia) : the three members of the panel are from the same country.
e) Valladolid (Spain) the four members of the panel are from the same country.

The list of judges which have been considered is the one for 1999/2000 dated on 27th April 99 and the list for 1998/1999 dated on 24th of March 98.

Abbreviation of the competition, for example SA for Salzburg (see correspondence on the sheet page 3).

Placing and number of competitors placed, for example 3/13 means third place with 13 competitors placed.

Class F2A (speed)

- 14 competitions have been considered for the results in speed. Two other competitions have been cancelled for a lack of competitors (Rafaela in Argentina and Valladolid in Spain).
- 46 competitors are placed from 14 different countries.
- The most important competition in speed has been Sebnitz in Germany (13 competitors from 4 countries) followed by Landres in France (11 competitors from 5 countries) and Gyula in Hungary (10 competitors from 4 countries).
- The best junior is Michal ORDON (Poland) placed 27th with 4 points.
- The best speed realised during the year is from Luis PARRAMON (Spain) with 294,3 km/h at Vidreres in Spain.

- 18 competitions are considered for the results in aerobatics.
- 158 competitors are placed from 22 different countries.
- The most important competition in aerobatics has been Siggenthal in Switzerland (41 competitors from 9 countries) followed by Saint-Etienne in France (38 competitors from 7 countries) and Rouillé in France (34 competitors from 10 countries).
- The best junior is Rémy BERINGER (France) placed 14th with 44 points.

- 14 competitions are considered for the results in team-racing.
- 98 teams are placed from 20 different countries.
- The most important competitions in team-racing has been Piennes in France (27 teams from 9 countries) followed by Breitenbach in Switzerland (24 teams from 10 countries).
- The best junior team is Lionel BUCCI / Claire PERRET (France) placed 62th with 5 points.
- The best times realised during the year are from the team PENNISI/ROSSI (Italy) with 3' 11" 4 at Lugo di Romagna in Italy and MARET/PERRET (France) with 3' 11" 5 at Piennes in France.

Class F2D (combat)

- 11 competitions are considered for the results in combat. The competition of Dallas (USA) has been cancelled.
- 131 competitors are placed from 19 different countries.
- The most important competition in combat has been St. Petersburg in Russia (45 competitors from 7 countries) followed by Ekaterinburg in Russia (44 competitors but only from 2 countries) and Amerongen in Netherlands (41 competitors from 11 countries).
- The best junior is Alexander GUSEV (Russia) placed 4th with 43 points.
